DR OSTROM REPRISSES HER NOBEL ACCEPTANCE SPEECH...

From Karen Hanson: IU Professor Elinor Ostrom's receipt of the 2009 Sveriges Riksbank Prize in Economic Sciences in Memory of Alfred Nobel brought a great deal of excitement to the Bloomington campus. In December, Professor Ostrom travelled to Stockholm, Sweden to accept the award. There, she and the other Nobel Prize recipients delivered lectures as part of the week of activities leading up to the Nobel ceremony.

On Tuesday, February 16, Professor Ostrom will present her Nobel Prize lecture at the Indiana University Auditorium at 4 p.m. I invite you to attend.

The lecture, which is open to the public, will be much the same as the informal lecture Professor Ostrom delivered in Stockholm. In it, she will give an overview of the research she has done during her extraordinary career.

Diversity Theatre, a program of the City of Bloomington Community and Family Resources Department, presents the 3rd MOSAIC Film Festival! MOSAIC begins Saturday, Feb. 27 at the Monroe County Public Library beginning at 11 a.m., and continuing throughout the week.

On Tuesday, March 2, films will be shown at Rhino's All Age Music Club beginning at 7 p.m. On Wednesday, March 3, films will be shown at Rachael's Café, also

beginning at 7 p.m.

MOSAIC will conclude Saturday, March 6 at the Ellettsville Branch of the Monroe County Public Library, with shows beginning at 1 p.m. and 3 p.m.

MOSAIC features short films for adults highlighting poverty and homelessness, and films for children on disability and accepting differences. Among films scheduled are two by students at Batchelor Middle School, one for adults and one for children.

All MOSAIC events are free and open to the public.

Participants will have opportunities to discuss films and the issues they highlight with representatives of local agencies which are partnering with MOSAIC and which provide services in the areas of poverty, homelessness, and disability. Representatives include Reverend Virginia Hall of Trinity Episcopal Church, Joel Rekas, Executive Director of Shalom Community Center, and Sheri Benham, Executive Director of Stepping Stones, Inc.

Filmmaker Jo Throckmorton will also be on hand to present remarks about his film, *Hard Life*, on Saturday, Feb. 27.
